## COVID-19 Concession Stand Guidance

As licensed food service establishments, concession stands are expected to operate under the same set of requirements as restaurants. The requirements are as follows:

- **Everyone in the concession stand must be screened for symptoms** prior to entering the concession stand. This can be done by having workers fill out a questionnaire when they arrive. Temperature checks can either be done by each individual at home before traveling to the concession stand, or they can be taken at the door using a touchless thermometer. An example questionnaire has been included with this guidance document and may be used by your concession stand. (Section 1(f) of [EO 2020-175](#))
- **Prohibit sick workers from entering** the concession stand. Make sure workers know not to even come to the event if they are feeling ill. (Section 2(j) of [EO 2020-178](#))
- **Close the concession stand immediately if someone develops symptoms while working.** After closing, perform a deep clean of the concession stand. Make sure to use an [EPA-approved disinfectant](#) and to follow guidance from the FDA and [CDC](#). (Section 8(r) of [EO 2020-175](#))
- **Everyone in the concession stand must wear a face covering.** Face coverings must cover **both** the nose and mouth. (Sections 1(j) and 8(n) of [EO 2020-175](#))
- **Keep workers 6 feet apart to the maximum extent possible.** Consider rearranging work areas, creating designated stations, or limiting the number of workers in order to keep everyone socially distanced. (Sections 1(g) and 8(t) of [EO 2020-175](#))
- **Use markings to keep customers 6 feet apart while in line.** Signs and physical guides, such as tape on the ground, will help customers know how to appropriately spread out. (Section 8(j) of [EO 2020-175](#)).
- **Eliminate, or limit as much as possible, shared items for customers.** Have workers put condiments on foods, such as hot dogs or burgers, instead of providing condiment dispensers for customers. (Section 8(o) of [EO 2020-175](#))
- **Post signs instructing customers not to eat their food until they are seated and/or appropriately socially distanced.** Customers should not be removing face coverings to eat while walking around and potentially coming within 6 feet of other people. (Section 8(l) of [EO 2020-175](#))
- **Routinely clean and disinfect high-touch surfaces.** This includes door handles, shared equipment, cash registers, etc. (Section 8(k) [EO 2020-175](#))

If you answer **YES** to any of the symptoms listed in question 1, **OR YES** to two or more of the symptoms listed in question 2, do not go into work. Self-isolate at home and contact your healthcare provider to discuss symptoms and COVID-19 testing. If you do not have a healthcare provider, you may contact the Lenawee County Health Department at (517) 264-5226, Option 5 to speak with a Public Health Nurse (Monday – Friday 8:00am – 4:30pm).

- If you test positive, call your local health department and make them aware of your testing results.
- You should isolate at home for a minimum of 10 days since symptoms first appeared or per guidance of your local health department.
- You must also have 24 hours without a fever and improvement in symptoms.
- If you are not a close contact and your test comes back negative, you may return once your symptoms have resolved, or based on guidance from your healthcare provider. If you are a close contact (see question 3), you must still complete the 14-day quarantine regardless of test results.

If you answer **YES** to this question, do not go into work. Self-quarantine at home for 14 days. Contact your healthcare provider if you have symptoms. If you do not have a healthcare provider, contact the Lenawee County Health Department at 517-264-5226 option 5.

4. Have you been tested for COVID-19 and are waiting for results?  Yes  No

If yes, you must isolate at home until you receive negative results. You then may return based on guidance from your physician for your predominate symptoms (see "[Managing Communicable Diseases in Schools](#)"), unless you have had close contact with a COVID positive individual (question 3) in which case you must still quarantine at home for 14 days. Note: If are you routinely tested as part of your job, AND you do not have symptoms or close contact with a COVID positive individual, then you do not need to isolate.
